Update on District Finances

Despite the challenges of higher operating expenses in recent years due to the rising cost of water, Shoreline Water District is pleased to have received an ongoing Aa3 Bond Rating from Moody's Investors Service, citing a "Healthy Financial Position Characterized by Strong Debt Service Coverage and Adequate Cash Reserves." According to Moody's, this confirmation is a direct reflection of Shoreline Water District's "stable residential customer base, strong finances, history of prudent and timely rate adjustments, as well as a low debt profile."

Shoreline Water District's staff is committed to being good stewards of our ratepayers' money, and has worked tirelessly to maintain a positive and stable financial condition. We believe our recent clean audit report and subsequent Aa3 Bond rating are a direct result of our strong financial policies, conservative budget planning, and diligent financial management. Bottled Water Versus Tap Water Get the Real Facts...

By now, most people recognize the many health benefits of drinking water, including better digestion, circulation and the transport

and absorption of nutrients. But does it make a difference where the water comes from?

Although there are many different ways to determine or define "better," Shoreline Water District is proud of our water quality and confident that after comparing Tap Water to Bottled Water, you will agree that Tap Water is, by far, the better choice.

First, let's talk money

On average, a bottle of water costs \$1.29 for about 16 ounces of water. On the other hand, one unit (748 gallons) of water from Shoreline Water District costs \$2.71. So, for about the amount you would pay for two bottles of water, you could fill up a 16 ounce water bottle 5,984 times. It seems clear: tap water is the better choice in terms of cost.

Next, let's compare safety

The Safe Drinking Water Act (SDWA) is the main federal law that ensures the quality of our drinking water. The SDWA was originally passed by Congress in 1974 and was amended in 1986 and 1996 to ensure the protection of water and its sources.

Tap water is likewise regulated by the US Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). According to the EPA, public drinking water cannot have confirmed detections of E. coli, and it must contain a chlorine residual to prevent bacteria growth.



Locally speaking, our water comes from protected watersheds, and has been treated using filtering, ozonation and ultraviolet light, after which it is tested for hundreds of contaminants on a regular basis to ensure safety and good public health. As a final measure of safety, we are required by state and federal law to provide an annual water quality report (which was mailed out two months ago; if you did not receive your copy or would like an additional one, feel free to give us a call).

Compare this to bottled water, which is regulated by the Food and Drug Administration. A certain amount of bacteria is allowable without action being taken. There are no federal filtration or disinfection requirements on the bottled water industry and NO disinfectant is present to kill bacteria in bottles, nor are there any reporting requirements.

With these differences in the regulations, it seems easy to deduce that drinking tap water is the safer option.

Finally, let's talk taste

The final comparison would be to ask the obvious question, "Which one tastes better?" This is a subjective question and varies from person to person, but we were curious to find out if the public could distinguish between the two sources of water, based on taste.

In order to find this out, we conducted a taste test at the STEM Career Expo on March 23, 2013 at Shoreline Community College. We found the majority of testers either couldn't tell the difference between the two, or they said that the tap water tasted better. But don't take their word for it, come decide for yourself: beginning on August 13, you can fill up your water bottle with our brand new water dispenser inside our remodeled Administration Office. Stop by and give it a try!
